## What is in your heart?

Wow! It seems we just turned the corner into a New Year, and here it is already February! Now, nothing would be particularly significant to me about February if it were not for Valentine's Day, with its visions of white lacey hearts, big-bling diamond-shaped hearts, red hearts, and of course, chocolate hearts, all when given to us, turn our hearts toward thoughts of "love!"

The Bible consistently uses the heart as the symbol for emotions. And, though Paul talks much about the heart in his other writings, he refers to the heart only twice in Philippians: once to his own heart, and once to the hearts of the believers.

In the opening verses, he talks about his love for the Philippian believers, whom he calls saints; he talks fondly of his memories of them, his prayers for them and his intense desire to be with them. He writes: *It is right for me to feel this way about all of you, since I have you in my heart (Philippians 1:7, NIV).*

When I read this verse, I stopped to ponder — I love that word "ponder," don't you! Realizing this book was written from prison to prob-

ably mostly converted Romans, and not Jews, questions came to mind such as "What could have been in Paul's heart for the Philippians?"

And then, "What is in my own heart, as I begin this New Year?" As I dug deeper, what I saw in Paul's heart was deep affection for these believers, an unfailing commitment to Christ and total abandonment to doing the will of God. And the by-product of these was the joy of the Lord in his relationships.

Because I've encountered God's grace, that's exactly what I have in my heart for you, my brothers and sisters in our Emmaus Community of believers, and I believe your heart holds the same! So, how do we "outflow" this to others? Somebody said: "Random acts of kindness are what outflow is."

Just imagine what would happen if each of the more than 16,000+ of us in the Alabama Emmaus Community began to live out our 4<sup>th</sup> Days in this New Year, without having a self-seeking motive, by doing one act of agape every day that made another person's life a little better.

How great would a fellow worker feel if he or she had a cup of tea or coffee delivered when not expecting it? How surprised would a nursing home resident be to receive a bouquet of fresh flowers?

## Where are your treasures? Matt. 6: 19-21

We are rapidly approaching the season of Lent when we spend time examining our priorities and commitments. These thoughts came to me as I was packing up Christmas decorations. This led me to the fact that we spend a lot of time and money storing up our treasures.

It would probably be amazing to know how much we have spent in our household to store Christmas decorations! As I was storing these

decorations, I was reminded of a children's story that I once heard where a paper heart was placed inside a box with other treasures. This was to remind the children that treasures are where we have our hearts.

We all have things that we treasure. Ladies may keep treasure in a jewelry box. Men may keep treasure in a small chest. The treasures that we keep are of great worth to us.

There may be some jewelry that belonged to our grandparents or our great-grandparents. It could be items other than

jewelry. Some treasures are more valuable than others. All these things are earthly treasure that possibly will be passed on to other generations. In all likelihood these treasures will not mean as much to other generations as they do to us.

## A Day of New Beginnings!

As I write this article many new beginnings are taking place. A new year has begun, churches are making plans for the coming year, friends are having their first grandchild, and a new president is in place. One thing that does not change, however, is the responsibility of a sponsor for his or her pilgrim. It is wonderful to sponsor pilgrims, if after time and prayer, one is led to do so; but remember it does come with a job description. The second step is a proper application.

The application needs to be complete. This includes especially the church they attend and any special needs they may have. Please remember special needs are only shared with the lay director of the Walk and the persons on the team that would need to be aware of this information. The \$30.00 deposit must be included with the application. Explain the questions asked on the application to your pilgrim. This is an important part of preparing your pilgrim. A well-informed pilgrim will have a better Emmaus experience. The Walk always has some surprises for them, but pilgrims should have at least an idea of what to expect during the weekend. In short, new pilgrims should know enough about the Walk to ensure their comfort.

If you do not submit a self addressed stamped postcard for acknowledgement, you or your pilgrim will not receive anything from the office until your pilgrim is invited. That might be several months. Letting your pilgrim know as soon as possible the date of their scheduled Walk is good in case they have a conflict. It would keep them from having to re-schedule and delay their Walk longer.

If the application is complete, pilgrims are scheduled the day their application is received. At this time the waiting time for men is shorter than women. When you have a scheduled date, know that your pilgrim's invitation will be mailed approximately two months before that scheduled date. A letter is mailed to you, as their sponsor, at the same time. If you

In the Emmaus Community we can also share God's love with extravagant applause of affirmation, which takes no more time than about 7 seconds, when a new Pilgrim, or anyone for that matter, gets up to share, instead of just giving them a one-clap thump!

"Greater love has no one than this, than to lay down one's life for his friends," is often-quoted from the Bible. We're seldom asked to lay down our lives in our civilized society; but what we are asked to do is set aside ourselves and allow Jesus to live through us in the world today: first in Christian service to God through our local church and then through Emmaus.

As we "...trust in the Lord with all our hearts and lean not to our own understanding, God will direct our steps." It's not our love that we share, it's Christ's love that has filled our hearts. ## Are you a responsible sponsor?

Too often problems arise before, during, and after Walks because of "poor" sponsorship. Following are some helpful hints to insure that the person(s) you may sponsor for the Emmaus Walks will have a rewarding experience and in turn become successful sponsors.

Sponsorship is defined in dictionaries as "someone who is RESPONSIBLE for a person or thing." In the case of being an Emmaus sponsor, that definition applies to both, persons and things!

Not only does an Emmaus sponsor prepare the Pilgrim for this 72-hour experience, he or she also prepares their family members by honestly and thoroughly answering questions regarding the Walk and by keeping in contact with family members during the Walk weekend.

The sponsor insures that the pilgrim arrives at Camp Sumatanga on time (preferably by 6:30 p.m.) and has proper bedding, linens, clothes and sponsor's phone number.

Also, the pilgrim's family is provided the sponsor's phone number, in order to assist in any possible emergency situation.

Remember that prayer is the undergirding factor in all aspects of the Walk to Emmaus. Spend time in prayer for discernment in WHO to sponsor. The purpose of the 72-hour experience is to develop stronger church leadership. Hint...the Walk is designed for those already active in church!

A responsible sponsor should really know the person intended for spon-

sorship, and should be fully aware of the pilgrim's family situation. Trust between the sponsor and pilgrim is essential.

Guide the pilgrim in correctly completing the application. Sponsors are to mail applications to the appropriate person. Secure "love letters" (at least 12-15!) and make sure that they arrive at Camp no later than Candlelight.

Sponsors should attend Candlelight! Be present at Closing! Make sure that what comes to Camp leaves with you from Camp! Provide transportation to follow-up meeting for your pilgrim and encourage participation in Reunion Group activities.

Your careful attention to good Sponsorship will leave good, lasting impressions on your prospective pilgrims as they witness firsthand how you have been an example of His hands, feet, and voice!

Further information is available in a pamphlet entitled "Sponsorship," available for purchase through the Alabama Emmaus Community.
