The older I get, the more I find myself on unfamiliar ground. Certainly, unfamiliar ground is not something that I desire as I am the kind of person who has always wanted a plan for not only today and tomorrow, but for next week as well. Recently, too many of my dear friends who I have loved and been blessed to work and worship with in the Emmaus community have left us physically and now have entered true life.

We all have attempted to bring words of comfort to the widows and widowers, family, and friends left behind, who are struggling to cope with the loss of it all. This has caused me to reflect upon the ever-present realization of the loss of my dear wife, Vikki, some three and a half years ago, who was the better part of me for over 40 years. We never imagine that life could possibly be this way.

After her death, uncertain as to what lay ahead, I asked God to be with me and direct my path. Maybe it is easier to be open to God and to let down our many barriers that we erect to His will for us when we are most broken and alone. In attempting to comfort me several years ago, a dear Christian friend, who had lost her husband, de-

scribed her life (and now my life) as being "abnormal." She said that life is now abnormal and, in a sense, will always be. Regardless, she said, life will never, ever again be as it was or as we would hope it would be. Others, who themselves have lost a spouse, have said to the newly-single friend that perhaps as the days go by, it doesn't get better but it may get easier to cope with. In each newsletter, we have a section that contains the names of those that have lost spouses and loved ones, and it is good and fitting that we remember and pray for them.

I also think about how many of us find ourselves on unfamiliar ground or out of our comfort zone by reason of a lost job, a change of employment, or the struggle with a debilitating injury or illness. Those things that used to be so normal, familiar, and expected are gone. The good news is that it is okay. Unfamiliar ground really may be a more accurate description of life than I had envisioned before.

After all, Jesus, in His earthly life, even commented that at times He had no place to lay his head but constantly focused on the desires of His Heavenly Father. Perhaps, unfamiliar ground is the

What is that in your hand?

When things look too big for us to handle, we often just throw up our hands in disbelief and doubt. Could it be when things look too big we do not need to throw up our hands but instead we need to LOOK in our hands?

Most of us are familiar with the story of Moses. Born in a time when new-born males were killed by the Egyptians, he was rescued from the water by Pharaoh's daughter. He was raised in the palace with royalty. But something was different, and it was Moses. He was not Egyptian; he was an Israelite.

As the story goes, he killed an Egyptian for beating a slave and was forced to run away for his own safety. He fled to Midian, marries

Jethro's daughter, and becomes a shepherd. From the Palace to the Pasture!

There is an old Rabbinical tale of a lost sheep from Moses' flock. Moses searches and searches until he finds the lost one. Instead of chastising and scolding the animal, Moses gently bends down, lifts up the sheep and says, "Oh, I am so sorry you got lost. You must be weary. Let me carry you back home." The Rabbin say that was when God, who had been looking down from heaven, said: "That is the one I want to shepherd My people Israel back home."

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Emmaus Board Actions

The Board of Directors of the Alabama Emmaus Community has been hard at work and has made following actions:

April

Accepted minor revisions made to the Speakers Prayer Chapel Committee information.

May

Selected Lay Directors for the last half of 2013 through the first half of 2014.

Eliminated the walks in January of 2013 and 2014, re-numbered remaining Walks, and reassigned gender to some other walks.

Voted to limit the number of pilgrims on walks to 28 for men and 35 for women. The June walk will have up to 49, due to the large number of school teachers needing this walk.

Approved a Policy and Procedure for compliance with the Lay Director Covenant Agreement.

Approved a \$250 gift from the Emmaus Community to the New Hope Children's Center in memory of Jeffrey Jones.

Adopted a policy for two persons (Community Treasurer and Assistant Community Lay Director) to be accountable for all Emmaus financial transactions.

June

Approved the nomination of Paula Calhoun to become the Assistant Community Spiritual Director.

Approved a donation from the Emmaus Community to the family of Bud Bottcher to go to the charity of their choice.

July

Approved a request from the Community Coordinator to change to a printing company in Talladega.

Approved changes made to the Housing & Registration and the Food Service committees information to comply with Camp requests.

Voted to keep the number of agape pieces at 80. Numbers of pilgrims may increase later and changing back and forth would be confusing. "Extra" agape can be used for non-conference room team.

Answers to frequent Community questions

I frequently get questions in the office about the walk. I would like to answer some of the questions that I have been asked recently in hopes that it might be helpful. Some changes have been made recently and other things have not changed in some time.

1. How many pilgrims are scheduled for a Walk? Recently the Board voted to limit the number of pilgrims on men's walks to 28 and on women's to 35, except the June walk when it can be up to 49. The smaller walks seem to working very well. Conference room dynamics, bonding and logistics all benefit from the smaller numbers.

2. What is the cost for the walk? The cost for the walk is \$160.00. A \$30.00 deposit should be included with the application leaving a balance due of \$130.00.

3. What are the times for services during a walk? Sponsor's Hour is in Hutto Auditorium at 7:00 PM, Thursday. You should plan to be at Camp between 6:30 & 7:00 PM. Candle-light begins in Hutto Auditorium at 7:45 PM, Saturday. Closing is in Hutto Auditorium, at 4:45 PM, Sunday.

4. How are pilgrims scheduled and invited? A pilgrim is scheduled to the next available walk on the day the completed application is received in the office. An invitation is mailed to the pilgrim and a letter to the sponsor is mailed approximately two months before the walk date. The pilgrim has one month to confirm the invitation. The date the confirmation is due is included in these letters. If the confirmation is not received by that date, the pilgrim is removed from that walk. It is the responsibility of the sponsor to see that this confirmation is mailed back even if the pilgrim is declining the invitation.

5. Why do I have to provide transportation for my pilgrim to Camp and then make his or her bed when we arrive? One word - Good Sponsorship. This is an act of true servant hood. We are there to serve our pilgrims. All acts of agape during the walk are to demonstrate God's love for the pilgrims and the sacrifices made by the sponsors for the pilgrims and their families are foremost among these.

These are a limited number of questions but I hope they might help. Please contact the office if you have other questions you would like answered. As I was taught in college, if I don't have an answer I will find one for you.

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burned. So he turns aside to see why it did not burn up. And there was a perfectly good explanation: it was not a flame! It was an angel appearing as a flame. (Exodus 3:2)

So Moses goes to check it out and that is when a most marvelous conversation begins between Moses and God.

The Lord said, "I have observed the misery of my people who are in Egypt; I have heard their cry on account of their taskmasters. Indeed, I know their sufferings, and I have come down to deliver them from the Egyptians, and to bring them up out of that land to a good and broad land, a land flowing with milk and honey ... But Moses said to God, "Who am I that I should go to Pharaoh, and bring the Israelites out of Egypt?"

Suddenly Moses sounds just like us! When we are asked to do a task, we begin to make excuses. It may be we do not want to, or we do not think we can do a good job, or we just think someone else could do better. *WHO AM I?*

So Moses starts making excuses: "Who am I to go back to Egypt - they want to kill me over there." *DON'T WORRY, I WILL BE WITH YOU.* "What if they ask Your name - you know "Who Sent You?" YOU JUST SAY "*EHYEH-ASHER-EHYEH*" *I AM WHO I AM*

SENT ME!

Then Moses said "But suppose they do not believe me or listen to me but say, 'The LORD did not appear to you.'" The Lord said to him, "*WHAT IS THAT IN YOUR HAND?*"

Moses, don't you understand? Those hands will gesture before Pharaoh. Those hands will direct plagues over the land. Those hands will lead My people out of Egypt. Those hands will be lifted up to divide the sea. Those hands bring My law to Israel. Those hands will show them the way to the door of the Promised Land. "*WHAT IS THAT IN YOUR HAND?*"

And with His human hands Jesus turned water into wine. He calmed the storm. He healed the sick, raised the dead, and broke the bread. Then He spread out his hands on a cross for you and me. And as a Risen Christ He now reaches out to us.

When your pastor calls, or even someone from Emmaus, how often do we say those words, "I can't do that!?" And we, like Moses, begin to make our excuses. Maybe you should pause before responding and listen to that deep bass voice which sounds like thunder, or the calming whisper. He is calling you by name? What Is That In Your Hand?
