Continue to further Kingdom

I attended Alabama Emmaus Walk #1 in May, 1982. During this year that I have served as Community Spiritual Director, I have spent more time reflecting on my Walk and the impact it has had on my life than anytime during the past 34 years. Mainly, what is different about my life because of the Walk to Emmaus?

Probably the biggest influence has been the wide spectrum of people whom I have encountered. I have met and interacted with literally hundreds of people, both pilgrims and team members. I have listened to hundreds of Dying Moments and been moved by countless stories of tragedy and faith. This has enabled me to put my life experiences and spiritual perspectives in the context of a wide variety of settings. A somewhat narrow theological outlook has evolved into a wider understanding of other viewpoints. I am better able to celebrate the "bright colors (*de colores*)" that make the Walk to Emmaus a

gift to the church of Jesus Christ.

As the pastor of "Emmaus churches," I have been blessed to share ministry with many who returned from Emmaus putting into practice their answer to the question, "What am I going to do about it?" And, they accomplished that without any air of superiority. Like the Community Lay Director's talk on Sunday afternoon says, "There have been generations of Christians before there was a Walk to Emmaus."

Perhaps my biggest disappointment has been the deterioration of many of the clusters in our community. With a total of more than 20,000 people having attended the Alabama Walk to Emmaus (in the last newsletter I presented a lower number that prompted a numerical update), I would estimate that less than 10 percent participate in monthly cluster gatherings. When I ask people why they do not attend most, say that they attended for a while after their Walk, missed a couple of months,
